MICHELLE takes a couple of practice swings with her putter.

Seemingly happy with her stroke, she positions the club behind the ball.

From 5ft away she swings the putter back and forth in a smooth pendulum motion. The ball travels straight into the heart of the

hole and sinks with a satisfying plop. Holing a 5ft putt? You might think this is

routine. For some people it might be – but bear in mind Michelle cannot

mind Michelle cannot see anything. She is blind.

Along with a group from Four Swans Vision, Michelle took part in three weeks of golf lessons with professional Chris Payne at Chadwell Springs Golf Club in Ware.

Iattendedtheputtingsession,butChris assured me the group were equally successful with their lofted clubs.

The idea for teaching golf to visually impaired people came to Chris after Four Swans' VI tennis lessons were featured in the *Mercury* last year.

Chris said: "I read in the paper that Four Swans Vision had done tennis.

"I suppose I've always been interested in wanting to teach blind or visually-impaired people.

"If their technique is okay they'll still be able to hit good shots. "The fact they can't see the ball isn't

necessarily a disadvantage.

"If they can do tennis with a moving ball they should be able to hit a stationary ball." The VI golfers are aided by a guide,

who helps them line up shots correctly.

After that, it is up to the golfer to

swing through the ball.

Midway through the lesson, Chris set up a task which involved trying to gauge distance. Each of us stepped up and hit balls first to a marker 5ft away, then 10ft, then 15ft.

The idea is that this provides a memory of how hard you need to hit a putt. Visually impaired golfers have to rely much

more on their feel for a shot. In his first lesson with Four Swans, Chris introduced the group to the theory that if their technique was correct they would be able to play good shots.

Even so, he was impressed with some of the performances.

Chris said: "I think some of them were quite surprised by the quality of their shots. "Michelle, who is totally blind, was betten

The reaction from the group was unanimously positive. Fiona Musgrove from Four



Swans said: "Everyone really enjoyed it and I think it was a really great experi-ence for Four Swans to have had.

'What was even more important was the fact that when visually impaired people access these activities transport is always a major problem. If it wasn't for Chris coming to pick us up in the mini-bus we wouldn't have been able to do it.

"I'd also like to thank the volunteers who helped us aim – they were a great help.

Michelle, who lives in Elm Drive, Cheshunt, said: "I just loved it. The hardest thing is trying to find where the ball is but thankfully I had a couple of helpers.

"They kept telling me how every shot, or at least most of the shots, were dead straight. Chris was very encouraging and really helpful.

"It would be nice to carry on doing it." An admission: When I came to try putting without being able to see, I was nigh on useless.

Fitted with a blindfold, I knew the hole was pretty close and my putter was placed somewhere behind the ball.

I swung the club as I was told to and



pricked my ears for the sound of the ball dropping into the hole. But all that I heard were the words "that was so close".

In the course of the hour-long session, I failed to hole a single putt.

In all honesty, my failure was more down to my poor technique than anything else.

I've never been much of a golfer. But my annoyance was compounded

when our photographer Amelia stepped up to have a go. At first, it didn't even look as if she

knew which way up to hold the club. Then, on her third putt, she sent the

ball sailing straight into the hole. Cue incredulity from this embarrassed

reporter.
